Tony Gorn from ADF&G explained that if passed it would allow him to have a tool available to him to open a cow harvest hunt if the numbers drastically changed. Most AC members do not support a cow harvest at this time due to the declining moose population numbers in the areas covered by this proposal.

Support	12	1	Motion made by Tom Gray and seconded by Peter Buck to support the proposal. There is currently an over population of bears in the region and the tag fee exemption and not requiring a registration tag is intended to allow licensed hunters to harvest a bear during open season. The high bear densities in the vicinity of Nome is thought to be the root cause of the total Muskoxen calf crop mortality and several herds taking refuge from the predators within city limits. Registration tags would allow for a tool to determine how many hunters are actively hunting bear within the NNSAC region.

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Support			<p>the proposal.</p> <p>Board members were in support of the proposal as it is written for this year but there is a large concern that changes in the future may favor users in the northern portion of the caribou range. Thinking of changing of the open season dates could limit harvest due to the animal migration timing. GMU 22 hunters can only hunt when the caribou are present, the winter months of October to April. During early winter access is generally by wheeled vehicles and in late winter by snow machine. Some communities must travel far from home. The longer season provides opportunity but not necessarily additional harvest. The dates for non-resident in GMU 22 will be misleading to those unfamiliar with caribou hunting in GMU 22 and could lead to the illegal harvest of reindeer.</p>

Unanimous Support	13	0	<p>A motion was made by Kevin Knowlton and seconded by Peter Buck to limit the winter commercial harvest to 8% of the total annual fishery harvest.</p> <p>The AC members had a lengthy discussion on this proposal with members in the remote portions of the area wanting there to be a separate quota for their area and for the harvest in the Nome area of the fishery not to be lumped in their numbers. The allocation between the winter commercial and summer commercial fishery or the winter subsistence fishery focused on how the recent increases of winter commercial effort had aggravated user group conflicts.</p> <p>Long term data was reviewed and it was the opinion that when winter commercial harvest rose to 8% subsistence opportunity suffered. It was recognized that on poor ice years the issue was worse and that it might not be feasible to take that allocation. The roll over clause to allow the entire commercial GHL to be harvested in the summer season was a reasonable idea.</p>

Unanimous Support as amended	13	0	<p>A motion was made by Adem Boeckman and seconded by Nate Perkins to support the proposal with the following amendment: to restrict the number of pots that a commercial winter crab fisherman could register and fish at any one time to 20.</p> <p>With current shorefast ice situations the proposed season dates seemed the safest for the historic records and predications of future ice quality. The proposal addresses pot loss due to the ice movement and the ghost fishing that occurs when pots are not destroyed when they are lost. The proposal allowed for the department to modify the dates as necessary by emergency order were if the ice was safe enough in December then the department could open the season early and if the ice began to deteriorate early they would</p>



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			<p>have the tools to close the season early hence looking out for the safety of fishermen, search and rescue personnel and also in an effort to reduce the amount of fishing equipment that could be lost in the water due to persons taking risks to catch more crab when the situation is not safe. As written, the proposal did not address the pots that were deployed on the unstable margin of the ice by fishermen attempting to out fish their competitors. The higher prices of recent years have created a situation where pots are inexpensive in relation to their catch, thus making them expendable in the eyes of many fishers. This amendment would reduce the density of pot deployment and reduce the competitive impulse to place pots on unstable ice. It also provides a mechanism to quantify pot loss. If the loss rate is excessive this allows managers the ability to address the problem by closing the fishery. This proposal addresses a conservation issue, but will have minor allocative repercussions too. The NNSAC saw this as an issue that developed recently and which has significant implications for conservation.</p>

He also mentioned that the BOG should consider moving statewide regulation proposals to a three year cycle so that these issues would not potentially have to be addressed every year, whether a specific area of the State was in or out of cycle. Alex Whiting suggested that the BOG commit to having meetings in the regions being affected (as opposed to large urban centers), if the new three year cycle were adopted - the other AC members concurred with this sentiment.



Support With Modify	5	0	Pete Schaeffer expressed the view the KS AC generally supports the proposal as written with modifications agreed to by the AC members. Alex Whiting discussed these modifications: Close the non-resident season completely, as the KS AC can no longer support any take by non-subsistence users since we are now in conservation management according to the WACHWG Plan and likely to be in preservation management in the very near future when non-residents are supposed to get shut out completely anyway and that if local people are not getting what they need already and are going to impose more restrictive regulations on themselves, that they have no reason to support any use beyond local subsistence use; close bull caribou take from October 15 – January 15 when they are in rut and poor shape (even though it will likely deny some local use of younger bulls into late October that stay edible for longer than older bulls); increase dates of cow season closure from May 16 to April 15, so cow season would be closed from April 15 – June 30.

Support	5	0	Brandon Saito discussed precipitous decline in Dall Sheep in Unit 23 due to icing and other related causes, even lower population numbers than in the early 1990's decline, when it was closed for some years.

NEW BUSINESS:

Board of Fisheries Issues: (On time comment deadline March 3, 2015)

- a. **Proposal 272- Kuskokwim River: Consider providing the commissioner of ADF&G emergency order authority to restrict gillnet gear in the Kuskokwim River drainage**

Holly noted that the Board of Game proposals are now due March 2016 (Because BOG went to a three year cycle). Tommy K., stated that we need to really understand the proposals before we take actions. Willi Atti asked why there were changes or additions made to the proposal number 272. Holly explained the reason of the changes which was on the handout. Peter J., explained why the proposal is and if we need to discuss it and approve it. Peter stated that they use different mesh sizes when they fish at Goodnews and Quinhagak and wants more explanation from F&G. David explained the proposal and after discussion we could vote for it or not. Peter J. asked if it will affect the Kuskokwim and Goodnews area. Holly said it will be the Kuskokwim drainage ends at the mouth of the river. Kuskokwim area would include Goodnews and Quinhagak. Willi Atti stated if there could be a boundary like for the 4 inches to be used with the fishermen. Annie C. asked if they closed the fishery will it affect the sport fishermen. Holly said they would be the first ones to be closed. She noted that the Troopers never check on the sport fishermen. Holly said that they need to call the F/W troopers and they will fly out and check. Peter J., stated that if subsistence fishing is a top priority they are not allowed to fish and the sport fishermen keep on fishing, why is it that way. Holly said that they are supposed to stop fishing and it is an enforcement issue. David Carl explained the proposal 272 what it will mean or do with the fishermen. John P. said that he don't like the four inch mesh proposal because it limits the fishing and he used to be a commercial fishermen. Four inch mesh is mainly used for the white fish. Annie C. said that they also don't like the four inch mesh proposal. Tommy K. said that we shouldn't support this proposal because it might hurt other fishermen. He suggested hearing from Goodnews and Quinhagak concerns first before we take action on this. Holly explained with examples the proposal 272. She said that if they close the

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fishery because of low number of fish that they could still fish with four inch or smaller. She explained that we could vote section by section on the proposal, with the three sections. John Horner: The decline of the herd is due to the weather because of the rain and the ice? We don't know what the weather is going to do.

Louie Commack: The haul road got opened and the road here is going to get opened eventually too.

John Horner Sr.: AIDA the Ambler Road is state funded it is going to be opened

Glenn Miller: Roads are not a good thing to support our subsistence lifestyle; wolves use the roads to get around too. The wolf population increased along the roadside and they were sitting and waiting on the road. They are having an impact on the migratory movement. People get jobs then they move to Anchorage cause it is easier access. If people cannot see the pollution and the caribou herds going down from their houses they don't care. I care I want to live more of a subsistence lifestyle and roads are not good for that lifestyle.

John Horner Sr: Nova Copper has been exploring over the last several years and the caribou haven't been coming around Kobuk. This last summer the caribou came through when the exploration stopped.

Scott Jones: A lot of people are signing away the meat moose and caribou in Kotzebue. About 50% of the transporters are giving the meat away. They don't have interest in the meat; they only want the antlers and the hides. They are supposed to be taking care of the meat.

John Horner Sr.: What is being done about it?

Jim Dau: We want people to share the meat instead of wasting it.

Scott Jones: the transporters have rules and regulations that the meat has to come out. The antlers come out last.

Jim Dau: I think we have the meat waste currently solved.

Louie Commack: Questions what is classified as meat? There is a problem with the definition of meat. We eat the heart, bible, the kidney, liver we use those things they should be included in the definition of meat. This is part of the diet.

Shield Downey: Need to have meat care regulations, it is important not to keep in a plastic bag, some of it is green.

We go out and look for the caribou but they are migrating later. Later by regulation would be a hard thing to do. They have been staying later into October and weather and safety is an issue.</p> <p>Glenn Miller: The weather changes quick. Everything froze in one day in Kiana, they were chipping boats out.</p> <p>John Horner Sr.: A regulation should exist that requires the transporter would move the meat once they get their game they have to transport the first day.</p>



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			<p>William Zibell: 5% is sport hunters which is 500-700 caribou. It is not helping any to just deal with sport hunters and not enough to impact the population. You mentioned two factors weather and predators: We can't control weather, and we can impact predators. We should focus brainstorm on increasing wolf and bear harvest. Maybe we could move from one bear to two bears per year. People from home literally say get your bear and get mine too. We live in an area that our supplies come from the Lower 48. It is the cows that are the problem. We need to be honest about getting bad looking skinny meat we leave it in the field we need to be honest about taking responsibility about that meat and safe guard the cows.</p> <p>Alvin: Do the sport hunters being transported in the Noatak region displace the caribou?</p> <p>Scott Jones: The transporters are stuck dropping on the hunters on one side of the Anasak River. They can see the caribou but they cannot get at them the water is cold and fast. It is unforgiving country.</p> <p>John Horner: I have heard the caribou are being displaced, is there a way we could put the Noatak later in the season for sport hunting?</p> <p>Jim Dau: The Noatak\Kivalina AC is working on proposals to make sport hunters wait till the first 1,000 caribou pass and to not allow sport hunting on the Noatak at all. These are hard to enforce.</p> <p>Louie Commack: We need to take a hard look at the timeline for how long it is going to take us to get to the crisis level we are heading towards. We need to think about how we are going to slow this decline down.</p> <p>Shield Downey:</p> <p>John Horner Sr.: How much longer do we have to wait till we are in a crisis?</p> <p>Nicole Braem: Explains Tier II hunts</p> <p>Larry Westlake Sr: We need to work together on the State and Federal side and we need to be proactive about dealing with the caribou decline before it becomes a crisis. 



Tyonek Fish & Game Advisory Committee Minutes 1.28.2015

Preceding the meeting, T.T.C.D. gave a presentation on our watershed (Beluga River to Nicolai Creek) and had community members voice their most valued resources of the watershed, and their main concerns of threats against those resources to provide them for a focus for future studies.

Chairman called meeting to order, in attendance were: Alex Pfoff, Gwen Chickalusion, Lindsey Bismark, Tina Constantine, Janelle Verduce, Chad Chickalusion, Larry Heilman, Judy Heilman, John Standifer, Frank Stadifer (on conference call), Christy Cincotta (TTCD), Nicole Swenson (TTCD), and Tonya Kaloa (TTCD).

Floor given to TTCD to discuss watershed plan more in depth. John raised the point that for a Pike fishing derby to have a significant effect on the Pike population, it would be beneficial to have the derby extend over as long of a time period as possible. Committee members agreed on this, TTCD stated that the goal of the initial derby is primarily to collect data on pike distribution, so that control methods can then be implemented based on the data collected. Other control methods were discussed, i.e. rotenone, gill nets, pike bounty.

Timing of next meeting was then discussed and the decision was made to check on availability of the tribal center at or around Weds, March 18th at 2:30 PM. I am still waiting to hear back from the office on this, and if anyone could ask about the availability in person if they are going to be at the tribal center that would be greatly appreciated!

Board of Game proposals relevant to 16B were discussed, and four proposals were voted upon to submit comments. This is how I intend to submit the comments to the Board of Game. Let me if there is anything that should be changed.

Tyonek Fish and Game Advisory Committee wishes to submit comments on the following proposed changes to regulation for the Board of Game; proposals #173, #192, #195 and #196.

Proposal # 174: The committee supports the proposal to remove meat salvage requirements for brown bear taken over bait in the Southcentral Region. The current regulations could put people at risk of exposure to trichinosis. It is also our belief that quality of bear meat is too variable to require meat salvage in all cases.

Vote: Unanimous (7 of 7 present; 9 total committee members)

Proposal #192: The committee opposes the proposal to require harvest reporting by species of migratory birds. We feel as though such a requirement is unreasonable, and would also question the accuracy and value of the data received from such data collection. It is our belief that this data would inevitably be falsified to meet compliance, and would likely only show info for the beginning of the season, as this is when the large majority of the harvesting occurs.

Subject: Proposal 143: Restrictions to bag limit (Change the bag limit restriction for brown bear in unit 8)

The Kodiak Advisory Committee (KAC) and our bear subcommittee - KUBS (**K**odiak **U**nified **B**ear **S**ubcommittee) unanimously **opposes** proposal 143.

The KAC opposes both possible solutions proposed, either (1) eliminating the regulation requiring a wounded bear counts as the bag limit for the year or (2) inserting the word “mortally” in front of wounded in the regulation.

The proposer claims it is an attempt to legislate ethics. We feel it is everyone’s responsibility to pursue and educate ethics whether it is the hunter, other hunters, guides, biologists, land managers, regulatory or enforcement agencies. The state and BOG have a history of legislating ethics, such as in the requirement of hunter safety and archery/muzzle loading certifications- which teach safety, laws, ethics, anatomy, proficiency, etc. We feel it is the BOG’s responsibility to manage a resource so that the wounding loss is minimized and every effort to recover it is maximized. We are proud that the State and BOG have helped set the bar for ethical behavior and do not want this regulation rescinded.

The proposer, contradictively, has also submitted proposal 193: Hunter education and orientation requirements-requesting crossbow certification; asking the BOG to legislate ethics.

We acknowledge that the current regulation is difficult to enforce, but believe adding “mortally” before wounded would make it even harder, if not impossible, to enforce. It is difficult enough to sometimes tell if an animal is wounded, but much more difficult, if not impossible, to try and determine how badly it is wounded or know its chances of survival.

We do not see any dilemmas created by this proposal as mentioned by the proposer, as noted below.

Dilemma 1) a person would naturally count an animal harvested against that years bag limit, even if they would have wounded it in any previous year.

Dilemma 2) it would be very easy to have a separate cutout on your harvest card stating wounded/not harvested, which would then make them not liable for wanton waste, for any animal. They naturally could then not possess any meat, hide, horns or antlers of said animal. (There is no requirement to salvage meat of Brown Bear in Unit 8)



Dilemma 3) quite often it is the opposite, where the hunter is tempted to take a “risky” shot, guided or unguided, due to time and money invested. This regulation gives the guide more reason to explain, or the unguided hunter more reason to think about, the necessity to take a more certain shot.

Dilemma 4) quite often the guide has many more resources available, equipment and manpower, and has more at stake than the unguided hunter and thus puts in more effort and does a more thorough job of trying to locate a wounded animal.

Unfortunately, there will always be the possibility of non law complying or unethical hunters, but this regulation **greatly** enhances ethical hunting practices and thus resource stewardship and conservation.

9) Committee comments: Julie Kavanaugh informed AC member that on February 18th the Gulf of Alaska pollock work group would meet in Anchorage. Kodiak brown bear hunts are one of the premiere hunts in the world and closely monitored. KAC Chairman Paul Chervenak will be writing a letter to the BOG further explaining our opposition to this proposal .

AC members feel that this proposal was mainly aimed at getting more sheep permits and opportunity for resident hunters. We also question the validity of the proposer's statement that a "significant portion of the large game species are taken by non residents". Additionally, the non-resident guiding and transport services are important economically in many small communities especially the rural villages. The majority of guides are residents (89%-McDowell 2014) and they bring much needed economic benefits to our local communities. This proposal isn't conservation based but is primarily trying to reallocate the resource.

Comment on Proposals before the Board of Game at the 2015 Central/Southwest Meeting

Proposal 202

Change the caribou regulation for all game management units associated with the Western Arctic caribou herd and Teshekpuk caribou herd by instituting one or more of the following options

- 1) *Change seasons:*
 - a. *Shorten season for bulls;*
 - b. *Shorten season for cows;*
 - c. *Close bull season after the rut (after October 1);*
 - d. *Keep cow season open when bulls are in rut (bull season closed);*
- 2) *Change bag limits:*

- a. Reduce total daily bag limit for residents;
 - b. Reduce total season bag limit for nonresidents;
 - c. Prohibit the take of calves;
 - d. Create 'bull only' bag limit during appropriate time of year;
 - e. Create 'cow only' bag limit during appropriate time of year;
 - f. Change resident daily bag limit to a total season (annual) bag limit;
- 3) Change exceptions to unlawful methods:
- a. Discontinue same day airborne hunting in Unit 22 [5 AAC 92.085 (8)(D)];
- 4) Manage hunts by permit
- a. Consider registration permit hunts in defined areas with harvest quotas, separately by herd.
 - b. Board of Game allocation of nonresident permits (drawing or registration)

The Koyukuk River AC is in favor of all of these measures to reduce harvest of Western Arctic and Teshekpuk caribou. We feel proposal 202 as written has the minimum restrictions to remain within the harvestable surplus of both caribou herds.

We would prefer to see longer cow caribou closures when bulls are better eating, (Feb 15- Oct. 1). Avoiding cow caribou harvest when Caribou are migrating before Oct. will protect lead cows that lead thousands of caribou to the wintering grounds. Herd deflection away from some communities has been a major user conflict issue. Cow caribou harvested after Oct. 1 are post lactation, and prime meat.

We would prefer to see large Bull's (with shovels) closed after Oct. 1 until they cast their antlers. Or) Bull caribou with shovels should have trophy value will be destroyed by cutting the top portion off of the antler after Oct. 1. The top portion of the antler should not be transported from the GMU taken in.

- Antlerless bulls should become legal in winter, through October 1.
- Large bulls killed in rut after Oct. 1 do not fill freezers; the meat fills dumps, as they are impalpable. Young bull caribou without shovels should still be available to harvest after Oct.1, as they can be eaten. Bull and cow caribou should be conserved for the proper time of year to harvest.

****The phone lines were down to both Allakaket and Alatna so neither community was able to participate. This subsistence practice is very important to both communities' identity as Upper Koyukon Athabascans/Inupiaq people. Therefore while quorum was not met, after draft recommendations from this meeting were signed off by the chairman of the AC, they were forwarded on to the Allakaket and Alatna Tribal Council for distribution to the members who were not able to take part in the meeting for review, as well as all other participants in the meeting. This document is the result of that process, and was signed off by those AC members as being in line with the desires of the Koyukuk River AC as a whole.***



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



- III. Approval of Agenda: Approved without objection but to include discussion of 3 year cycle for Board of Game meetings.
- IV. Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes: From meeting of October, 23, 2014 approved; notes from meeting of November 13, 2014 distributed. This latter meeting lacked quorum and no official business was conducted.
- V. Fish and Game Staff Present: Jeff Selinger, Game Biologist Soldotna. Thanks to him for traveling a second time to Seward to help with our deliberations.
- VI. Guests Present: None
- VII. Old Business: none
- VIII. New Business: Regarding the proposed three year cycle for the BOG, most felt the two year cycle was better. Seems more people and issues kept coming up that required attention. Two years allow better reaction time. There are issues such as the annual renewal of antlerless moose hunts that need to be authorized. The state will see significant budget problems in the coming years and the legislature and various agencies will have to decide what is of greatest importance and how to pay for those services.

Casey volunteered to be Chair of the Kid's Fishing Day next spring. He will receive the fishing poles and gear from Collman. The scheduled date is May 16, 2015. Organizing, fund raising and prizes need to be taking care of before the event. We encourage all AC members to participate.

The main business for this meeting is to review and make comments on the proposal that will be considered by the Board of Game at their March 13, 2015 meeting for GMU's 6,7, and 15 as well as relevant statewide proposals.

The local area is acknowledged to have low numbers of moose which is of continued concern to many AC members. Brown bears continue to be of concern as well. Comments on proposals reflect these concerns.

Regarding votes below, when numbers do not add up to the 7 members present, assume the remaining votes abstained.

Old Business

Wood Bison Restoration Project Management Plan

Joel spoke to this. The management plan is in near final draft. Fee for land use needed to be hashed out. The fee for Alaska residents other than shareholder will be \$300, for non-resident \$500-\$1500. A viewing fee would also apply.

Joel said Doyon owns 30% of the land. They do not allow any land use now but unanimously approved this. The board of Doyon is expected to endorse this plan. Expect to fly out 20-26 mature animals in March. Now that we know the land access we need to reiterate support. Steve motioned we support this plan. Seconded. Passed by unanimous consent.

Public testimony:

Richard Person talked to the AAC about the PWS Spot Shrimp fishery
Closely regulated fishery. Quota is established by survey conducted by dept.
40% commercial, 60% non-commercial allocation.

Opposed to proposals 253, 258, 259, and 260.

Favors proposals 253, 254, and 256.

His proposal requires Lat/Lon for each pot and to call in to Cordova office every Wednesday to report catch.

The proposals opposed either close or restrict the fishery. These are based upon the shrimp numbers going down. The graph provided indicates the shrimp numbers have slightly increased for the last 4 years for non-commercial catch. With that in mind his proposals are 255 and 256. This are a small boat fishery and they will like to fish with 5 pots on a string instead of 4 and not have to put the second buoy line on the string. This will reduce the number of buoys and the amount of line deployed.

Joel said both proposals are just the number of pots, not the pot limit. Float line entanglement can be a problem.

Robert Peck said on the personal use you have to identify your set on the buoy, do the commercial guys do. Yes, they have to have the ADFG number.

Neil, the vessel count is the number of boats, over the last few years the # of vessels have declined but the catch has gone up. Richard replied yes, the boats went down in numbers. This fishery is not for every boat, some cannot make money, other can.

The Sound is divided into 3 areas, only one is fished each year. The Whittier AC submitted proposal 254, Richard supports this proposal.

Steve asked Richard if he generally supports the Department's proposals. Richard said yes.

Joel asked Richard to explain the registration areas. Areas 1, 2, and 3 and the area E areas.

Joel said we, the Anchorage AC decided to take no action on these proposals.

Steve commented to Richard that there is a proposal for trapping to have your name on the traps.

Richard is opposed to it due to concern about anyone being able to place a name on a trap.

Steve Flory addressed the committee about the antlerless hunts. We were told these hunts would reduce collisions. Fences, lights and cutting back reduced the collisions, not killing cows. The department needs to prove with numbers that the hunts reduce collisions.

We doubt the numbers the department has provided. The department, when questioned about surveys, will say they did not get in an area. They extrapolate the numbers.

We are told to trust the experts, yet Kings, the Mulchatna and Northwest Arctic Caribou have disappeared.

We are told we can't transplant moose, yet other states have and we have in the past. The department opposed hunt 666 due to tourism. It is up to this committee to change the direction of the department.

Jim asked if funds from Robertson Pittman money to help relocate game.

Robert Peck asked what one area has numbers sufficient to support transplanting. The Portage herd is one.

Robert pointed out there is not an over-abundance of moose.

Steve said the Gustavus area is probably the one area with an abundance of moose.

Ehren questioned will the taking away of antlerless hunts result in the department devising other means. Steve said we have to start somewhere. What we are doing is not increasing moose populations.

George asked if Steve knew Dale that set up the ACs and why he set it up for the ACs to be able to stop the antlerless hunts. Watchdogs.

Steve said it was to have the department and ACs work together. This process has declined in effectiveness.

Jim asked about the road kill, and the possibility to attract the moose away from the road corridors. Steve is not a biologist. He has seen crushing efforts in other areas and this has helped. The moose will go to where it is easier to walk and feed. If the moose has nowhere to go, they will not move.

Jim Stubbs, former AC member addressed the AC about 60 foot gillnets in the Kasilof and Kenai rivers. He was the Vice Chair and Board of Fish Chair. Knows Cook Inlet well. Resigned from the AC in September.

Gill nets are indiscriminate killers.

Moose Meadows was given to them for gill nets. Then the battle started on the Kasilof. Small Steelhead numbers.

The native group was able to get a lobbyist to push this forward. It's a turf battle. He asked us to send a letter to the federal subsistence board to protest this. They are allowed 4000 reds and 1000 kings. Gill nets will catch anything.

Mark asked who monitors the catch, USFW is supposed to. There is supposedly a 24 hours from catch reporting time.

Mark asked is there a place we can read on the specifics of how this is done. Jim said we would have to find it on the Federal subsistence board website.

Neil asked if Jim will be testifying February 18th at the Dimond Hotel. Jim said he may.

Jim said it is prudent that the AC take a stance on Board nominees. He reminded us we represent all the people of Anchorage. He talked about the past history of the BOF nominee Roland and his being a drifter. Does not think he is a good fit for the board. It is too contentious. We need to focus on the health of the fishery. Whoever it is needs to represent the resource first.

Steve asked if Jim had any comments on the shrimp proposals. He is against it. In the 80s there was a severe crash and it took 20 years to recover from it.

Ted Spraker addressed the AC about the Sheep issue. He asked Christy Tibbles to review all the proposals that have gone through the ACs. 2002-2013 had 92 proposals in regards to sheep hunts, 22 more and another 7. He said we have not done much, only passed a handful

The board members are waiting on the guide concession proposals. This would be a real step up to address some of the sheep issues. He really wants to provide an insight to the upcoming meetings.

February 13th will have a town hall in Wasilla at 630 PM. Call in will be provided.

Some information will be provided, but not a tremendous amount. A few people will have information and bullet points available as a handout.

Primarily they want to listen to people.

Folks have been concerned about the board moving faster and making changes. The ACs spend a lot of time dealing with all the sheep proposals. It is time we get this to the public in a concise manner. They want to talk about establishing a working group. The department has \$150K set aside for a sheep-working group. The next part is to decide who will be on it. Will probably be run like the unit 4 brown bear management team. On this sheep issue it will be a failure to not have a strong AC voice on this board. The 5 or 6 ACs most affected should be on this working group. BOG would have 2-3, Fish and Game, Subsistence, Private land owners, current sheep hunters, AOC, SCI, the new Sheep Foundation group. The next phase, a 1976 management plan, thought Ken Taylor would be here tonight, those plans need to be updated. We are using plans that are 40 years old. F&G needs to update them. Then have the working group review it, then back to the public. This process may take 6 months to a year to complete. We need to get this moving.

22 proposals are legally noticed and published and will be looked at at the Wasilla meeting.

Ted is very uncomfortable pushing these forward until the working groups have a crack at it.

Other ACs are opting to push the proposals aside and go the working group route. Residents account for 80% of the hunters and need to be heard. Ted does not see any red flags from harvest. Cutting the harvest down will not change anything. The issue is a lot of dissatisfied hunters. Encourages us to get involved in this.

The meeting will be at the Best Western Lake Lucille.

Joel stated the working group would be vital. That will be after the town-hall meeting. Hopefully this meeting will get agreement for the working group.

Joel stated he knows this committee wants a place on this working group.

Ted said it will be a real mistake to not have ACs on this working group.

Robert Peck asked if it is true that sheep numbers are down 70%. Ted said he has heard its bout 50% in the Brooks. Resident hunters are trending down. Why are the resident hunting declining? Was it the federal subsistence? We lost 30% of the sheep hunting land.

Steve said board generated proposals and moving on them would be premature. These are statewide and we will be having a statewide meeting next year. The AC has a history of not embracing working groups. If a working group is formed, have it comprised of ACs first. The other organizations are special interest. ACs are elected and has a constituency.

Board generated proposals. When made they had attorneys there. The Board has the authority to generate a proposal on the spot and vote on it. He does not like it. He wanted to get those out since they have good ideas and options.

Second point about groups working together, whatever comes out of the working group will be reviewed by the BOG and back to the public before any decision is made.

Ted went on about the usefulness of the working groups as well as pitfalls.

Steve reiterated this is his last tour of duty on the AC and in May he will step down.

When this is all said and done, he would want people to say this has been a fair and transparent public process.

In 1986 he supported the spike fork and 50 inches or better. Steve reminded him about the 2002 appearance with regard to the Nelchina Caribou.

Robert Mumford addressed the AC about the probable end of his term on the board. He would like to stay on. He feels bad that he has not come before us enough. Its important that we get to know him. Sometimes he voted against what we wanted, and hopes he was able to articulate what and that we understood. He always tries to vote for the resource first.

Steve stated that last year we took up a proposal about black bear snaring in unit 3. It was supported by this AC and 10 others. It was supported by the Department too. The NPS opposed. Robert spoke to this proposal that he opposed it due to public testimony. Mumford said he had 3000 people in opposition of it. He does not personally support bear snaring. He has had an awful lot of people that told him they opposed it.

Robert Peck thanked him for what he does recognizing that we won't all agree.

Brett Wilbanks addressed the AC about the shrimp proposals. After Mr. Stubbs filled us in with 3rd party anecdotal testimony; it highlighted the controversy between commercial and non-commercial.

Stated the catch per unit is up as is the total poundage caught in the last several years. Close to 40% of the non-commercial harvest is right out of Whittier. The commercial effort is less than half of what is allowed. The number of the commercial participants is meager. There is a local demand that they are trying to fill.

His third priority is proposal 248 that suggested non-commercial shrimp fishers report their catch during the season so that F&G can better manage the resource. He contends the non-commercial reporting is inaccurate and thus undermines the ability to manage the fishery. If there is over fishing by the noncommercial fleet, there needs to be a mechanism to effectively manage the resource. Continue to allow commercial fishing and he is opposed to any proposal to reduce or eliminate commercial fishing and require noncommercial reporting.

Align the number of pots for both groups to 5 pots per string, (256), opposes 255.

Supports proposal 254. Limiting the catch to a statistical area has no bearing on what the area can support.

George said the department estimates the allowed catch, how. Brett said they do a survey though does not know how. He would be speculating on its accuracy.

Robert Peck asked about the 40% catch near Whittier. He asked why it is better to fish there. It must be due to an abundance of shrimp.

Ron Jordan addressed the AC about the Kenai River update USFW. Several Alaska Natives are not happy with that. They dip net along the Kenai and Kasilof Rivers. The gill nets will impact them.

The Governors appointment to the BOF is advocating shutting down the dip netting. He opposes this appointment.

F&G does a good job keeping data. Individual sportsman fill out the white card, but is it turned in and accounted for.

Fish and Game management change in the Knowles administration and we need to improve how it is managed.

Break at 810 PM to reconvene in 5 minutes.

VII. New Business: Reconvened at 8:24PM Committee Reports

Legislative Chair – Steve Flory

Suggest a few things to take up.

First thing is support or non-support for Rolland Maw for the BOF. Motion was seconded.

Steve stated he is devotedly commercial.

Does not believe this committee can support him and would like us to write to oppose his nomination.

Joel, to be clear, the Motion is to write a letter opposing his nomination to be sent to the legislature and Governor.

Neil spoke about the good we have done in northern Cook Inlet and supports bringing Chairman Johnstone back on to the BOF.

Joel talked about Mr. Stubbs appointment of Rolland Maws. There is potential for conflict between user groups. The relationship between Rolland and drift netters has been contentious. He disagrees with Neil's comments about Johnstone. He said he and Rolland Maw have not seen eye to eye on issues, but he is intelligent and knows salmon and Cook Inlet. When there is a conflict of interest, that person is conflicted out. Joel thinks he would be a great member for the BOF. The BOF with him will be better for it.

Robert Caywood stated we have to many commercial fishermen and need someone that looks out for the majority of our interests.

Question called, 11 opposed, 2 for it, 1 abstain.

Joel said it would serve the committee best if Steve drafted it. Steve said it is half done and can send it out by tomorrow afternoon. Steve will send it to the AAC through Joel.

The Governor wants to move forward with nomination for the BOG, Steve has 3.

His motion is we support:

Theresa Sager Albaugh
Al Barrette
Bethany Martin.

These are all people this committee has supported in the past. Al was previously rejected and it is unlikely he will be rejected again.

Joel stated taking up 3 at once will be cumbersome; we should take them up individually.

Motion to write a letter of support for Theresa Sager Albaugh – seconded
Robert supports her and Neil
Question called.
Passed unanimously.

Motion to write a letter of support for Al Barrette – seconded
Steve spoke in support of him.
Joel stated he has met and spoken with Al but does not know that much about Al.
Frank said he has watched Al participate at BOG meetings. He supports him.
Question called.
11 for, 3 abstained, 0 opposed.

Motion to write a letter of support for Bethany Martin – seconded
Steve spoke in support of her.
Robert said he had another person he supports. Lynn Keogh, Steve said he spoke with him and he is not interested.
Robert Peck has known her for a while and acknowledge she doesn't always agree.
Kevin asked what are we looking for in board members.
Steve said we look for those that think the same way this committee votes. Some members are definitely not looking first to the AC for their input. We want BOG members to talk to us. George asked Steve what makes him think Bethany has the knowledge to be on the BOG. Steve said she has been and stays engaged in the process and will help provide us more voice in the legislature.

5 yes, 2 oppose 7 abstain. Motion passed.

George Motioned we write a letter of support for Robert Mumford – seconded
Joel said we have a BOG meeting coming up and we have proposals we support. He will be there and we need to consider that.
Steve said he opposes Mr. Mumford. He does not attend many of our meetings, only 2 he knows of including tonight.

Neil spoke for Mr. Mumford because he has time to speak with us and is knowledgeable of the subject. Joel's perspective is when a proposal is before us, we listen, half say one way, half the other. We consider the data and input and decide based upon that and what is best for Anchorage and Alaska. He can respect what he has to say on the board.

Steve said Mr. Mumford will sit on the board regardless of what we say as the new members will not be seated until July 1. Arguing we need to appoint him because he is there now is like the department saying we need to support proposals because they already sold the tickets.

Mark asked Mr. Mumford if he supports the taking of cow moose in 14C. Depends on the public testimony and says the testimony supports it he would support it. He stated it is a case-by-case decision. Some areas yes, others no.

George asked if he believed in shooting cows with calves. At first he said yes, then he said no, then he said if it is necessary for habitat.

Neil stated that Steve Flory made a comment about moving moose and where we would get them. Knowing that shooting cows will not get the population back up. Neil lives in 16A and has no moose at all. Does he still think it is a good idea to have a cow hunt in 14C?

Robert Mumford said if it is possible to move them, we just went to a three-year cycle. The cost might make it not feasible. If we have the money and it would work yes. Sure would be worthy of trying.

Question called.

9 Yes-5 opposed-1 abstain.

Steve has the piece of legislature we want drafted is in draft now. Expects to see the first draft in short order. He will try to share it with everyone once it is done.

Fish Chair Joel Doner – Statewide Shellfish BOF Comments

Statewide shellfish was decided we would take no action until this meeting. Now would be the time to address any of the proposals we heard tonight.

Steve moved to support measure 248 – seconded

248 requires commercial to report, this would require the non-commercial to report at least once monthly while holding the permit. He thinks we should support this.

Question called.

Jim asked how this is reported numbers or weight reports it.

Mike said he supports this. We report on almost every harvest.

Robert Peck stated now we have to report, just not until the end of the season.

Proposal 248 Passed by unanimous vote.

Steve moved to support proposal 250 – seconded

Steve said we heard from those here tonight in support of the department's recommendation.

This proposal allows for only one vessel per participant

Question called passed unanimously

Steve moved we support 251 – seconded

Steve asked Robert if it would do much harm to close the entire beach as opposed to sections.

Robert said there is no other place to go unless you cross the Inlet. The Sea Otters have devastated the
clams.

Discussion is because permits will be issued before the Board of Game takes up the issue. In the re-</p>

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			<p>authorization, all antlerless moose hunts (basically cow moose) were combined with bull moose hunts which are against the committee's intent. The Anchorage biologist does not have an accurate count according to testimony last year. An amendment was offered to remove Kincaid Park from an antlerless moose (cow) amendment to allow a cow hunt proposed in Proposal 150. Vote was 13-1 in favor of the amendment.</p> <p><u>Meeting Minutes: December 2, 2014</u></p> <p>Public Testimony.</p> <p>The Chair then opened the meeting to public comments. Chris Garner, a biologist at JBER, stated that he opposed the action taken by the Committee on Proposal 148, the Reauthorization of 14C Moose Hunts. Mr. Garner stated the hunts are an outlet for both recreational opportunities for disabled veterans, military personal and also voiced public safety concerns with the amount of moose present. Stated the he believes that the biologist should be the primary voice of controlling wildlife population. He was asked if he had a count of the moose population but he deferred to the ADFG but did say that the moose population was healthy.</p> <p>Lex Patton, an Anchorage Firefighter, voiced concerns over the public safety issue that would occur if these antlerless moose hunts were not allowed. He was asked the committee if the new fencing and lights have helped cut down moose accident in those areas where they were installed. He stated yes in the affirmative.</p> <p>Warren Olsen made comments that a way should be found to move excess moose that are a public safety concern by means of capture and relocation. He also discussed enhanced habitat around roadways and public facilities should not be planted with vegetation that encourages moose to browse. Mr. Olsen stated that he was against antlerless moose hunts.</p> <p>Brett Barringer spoke on behalf of antlerless moose hunts stating that the biologist should control the population and that they have the most information needed to establish the amount of moose in the Anchorage Bowl. Stacey Frost, an area hunter, stated that she wanted to be able to hunt in 14C and had applied for permits. Ms. Frost told of hunting on JBER and would like to continue that opportunity if successful in drawing a permit.</p> <p>Bethany Marcun spoke in favor of the antlerless hunts and asked the committee to reconsider.</p> <p>Heidi Hatcher gave testimony of behalf of having the hunts citing that the biologist have the knowledge to control moose populations.</p> <p>Linda Nelson spoke on being at this meeting to show how the process works for her son in attendance.</p> <p>Ira Edwards spoke of public safety concerns and requested that the Committee overturn the vote on the antlerless moose hunts being proposed. Mr. Edwards also spoke on proposal 150 regarding hunts at Kincaid Park. Mr. Edwards, a</p>

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			<p>former biologist and wildlife officer stated that he had done some informal polling of user groups at Kincaid and that most had concerns with the public safety aspect of moose in the park. The results of the survey recommended that bull moose should not be taken as it is viewed by the responders as a positive thing for the Anchorage area. He stated that most people enjoy seeing and being able to bring visitors to Kincaid to see these animals.</p> <p>Phil Cannon spoke in favor of the antlerless moose hunts.</p> <p>Boyd McFail talked about the public safety concerns with moose collisions in the bowl area. Mr. McMcFail wanted to see if the board could support a proposal to get governing agencies to stop planting moose browse in public right ways and around public buildings as this brings moose into confrontation with cars and humans.</p> <p>Kurt Norby spoke in favor of the antlerless hunts.</p> <p>Ken Thompson spoke in favor of the hunts as this would give him an opportunity to take part.</p> <p>Ron Jordan, a past member of the Committee, spoke on the number of car incidents in the Anchorage bowl area. Mr. Jordan present numbers of incidents going back to 2009. Mr. Jordan stated road kill numbers up to include the year 2013 showed a decrease in the number of moose fatalities Numbers were provide by DOT and the other law agencies. Mr. Jordan was asked if he supported antlerless hunts and responded in the negative.</p> <p>Bryan Thornton spoke in favor of the antlerless hunts.</p> <p>It should be noted that several people in their public statements stated that they believed that the committee's action on this proposal could have been the result of hard feelings between the area biologist and the committee. The Chair and other members of the committee stated they believe that this was not the case in determining their vote on the subject.</p> <p>A break in the proceedings called for by the Chair.</p> <p>The Department of Fish and Game came forward to present their view on the antlerless hunt. Speaking for the agency was David Battle and David Saalfeld. The Department distributed a handout showing counts in the 14C area and gave an overview as to the condition of the moose population in the bowl area. 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			<p>Caywood and others questioned the biologists on the accuracy of their counts since they had stated that no total count had been taken in 2013 especially in the JBER area. Mr. Battle stated that wasn't the case as only two sections of the subsections were not represented do circumstances beyond their control. Lack of snow and JBER permission to do an aerial survey was given as the reasons. Mr. Peck questioned why the aerial survey hadn't taken place since times are available to fly the area in question.</p> <p>Mr. Brell and DeWitt asked why this information had not been provided to the committee before they asked to comment on the proposals. Mr. Battle stated that the committee hadn't asked for any numbers and thus no flow of information was provided.</p> <p>Question was raised by the committee as to what the statistical means were used to get to the composite number in the 14C. Mr. Saalfeld stated that past historical information to include field counts, aerial, and hunter provided information were used to provide an estimate of the current count following accepted past measures.</p> <p>Mr. Flory then asked why the numbers in the Board Proposal Book did not match the number in the handout provided for the years 2010-2013. Mr. Battle and Saalfeld stated that it may have been a computer generated error or bad input. The both stated that they would look into it and get back to the committee with that information at the next Game sub-committee meeting.</p> <p>Mr. Campbell asked which sub units has the most bulls in it. Mr. Battle stated that it was the Thunderbird Falls area. High concentration is due to no real hunting because of limited accessibility.</p> <p>The Chair thanked the Department for their presentation and the work that they do.</p> <p>A recess was called.</p> <p>The meeting was brought back into session and a motion made by Mr. Flory to bring up Proposal 148 for reconsideration. The motion was seconded and discussion took place as to the requirements of the 2/3 affirmative vote needed to bring the proposal back to the floor. A motion to table this proposal was made by Mr. Brell and seconded. Discussion was held. Mr. Neumann stated that it be in the public interest to take a vote of the measure tonight. He stated that the removal and transport of nuisance moose and abandoned calves should be transported to other areas in the State.</p> <p>Terrence Shanigan, a past member of the Susitna AC, spoke against the antler-less moose authorization. He stated that the removal of surplus or abandoned moose in other area would be a good for the general moose population.</p> <p>Paul Forward, retired forester, stated that he was in favor of the antler-less moose hunt proposed for 14C. Mr. Forward stated that he has walked the JBER area for many years both as a hunter and as a vocation and has seen more moose in the past and a steady amount in the last few years.</p> <p>Greg Arther stated that he would like to have access to the resource in the South Central area (14C). He believes that we should leave management of the resource to the Department of Fish and Game and let the hunts go forward as advertised at least for 2015 season.</p> <p>Tony Fuentes came to the meeting as a result of the newspaper articles that were written in the past on the 14C issue. He state that he supported local opportunity to hunt and wanted to view how the Committee worked. Mr. Fuentes spoke in favor of the hunts as they were proposed by Fish and Game.</p> <p>Frank (no last name) a long time resident and hunter who has not hunted in the last 4 years wants sustainability for all resources. He is against the antler-less hunt in 14C but believes that we should go ahead with 2015 hunt. He expressed hope that the AAC, Fish and Game, and the Board of Game could come to a timeframe that allows for a timely manner to review, approve proposals, and apply for permits.</p>

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			<p>Steve Ellis supports the reauthorization of the antler-less moose hunt and believes that the committee should take away any tools that supports the managing the moose resource that could alter the stated F&G goal of 1500-1800 moose in the 14C area.</p> <p>The Chair than asked if any other member of the audience would like to give testimony.</p> <p>Matt Madden, a member of the AAC in 1977, stated that he supported the reauthorization as it gives an opportunity to take part in the hunting process. Tyler Harder stated that the AAC had a moral and ethical to ensure that the resource was renewable. He stated that he is in support of the reauthorization.</p> <p>Mr. Brell stated that he had receive a letter of support for the reauthorization in 14C and wanted to place Kyle Pudge support on the record. We want to be saving the calves. If you vote against us your vote will nullify our AC. Consider that the Anchorage AC will be voting against the Mat-Su AC on future actions taken by the Mat Valley AC. Steve Bartelli noted that we haven't or won't in the future be voting against the Anchorage AC; we are independent AC and will be voting based on our independent information, discussions and decisions.

Frank Neuman, Anchorage AC: For clarification the Anchorage AC took a vote on # 148 but the motion was called back and they haven't taken final action and will not until 2/3/15 meeting. Steve Bartelli: what language are you considering amending? Frank: All options are on the table-it all comes down to how the committee will adopt the proposal-it is not dead.

Robert Caywood, Anchorage AC: Cow hunts in general have all the AC's in turmoil-they had a biologist on the ground because he wanted to shoot cows. They shot so many cows that they didn't have enough to meet the ANF. We have to manage the game to the highest sustainable yield. If we don't take care of our moose we won't have any.

browsed. The Dept. maintains that it is of paramount importance to obtaining objectives. Most of cow hunts are on JBER. Due to changing to a 3 year BOG cycle the next opportunity to make changes will be 2019-with the first season available in 2020. Tom-what % of cows harvested in 14C come from JBER? Jessy: The majority of cows harvested in 14C come from JBER-roughly 98%. There has been a 50% success rate-between 5-8 annually. Steve-who makes the call on how many cows are taken? Jessy-that is my decision with Dave. Steve: I want to make sure Dept has the spine to authorize or stop the hunts based on sound biological reasoning, external pressures notwithstanding. Jessy indicates that they will authorize the hunts if appropriate. Steve is inclined to put trust in the Dept as opposed to antidotal info. Jessy said no counts conducted in 2014 due to lack of snow, but in 2013 on JBER the calf cow ratio was 30:100. Herman doesn't have any problems with proposal. Dan: What was the cow harvest in 2013 & 2014? Jessy: 25 in 2013. JBER has not had as high a harvest this year because of a lack of snow. The data is not complete yet but is heading to single digits. Dan: are you confident with the 1500 count? Jessy: yes with the data we have now. Tom: has this been the population objective for 1500 for the long term? Jessy: since 2005 it has been 1800-1500 moose. Terry notes that he supports this proposal. He believes that this gives the Dept another tool to use. He has talked with both current and retired biologists and believes that to maintain a healthy moose population and avoid over growth which can lead to starvation or disease, in addition to moose-people conflicts, you have to have the option of reducing numbers to maintain the proper ratio of bulls to cows for healthy reproduction. Terry also concurs with Steve that he is also inclined to put trust in the Dept data as opposed to antidotal information from others. Jehnifer indicates that she has received several emails and calls from members of the public expressing support for proposal # 148.

Proposal # 148 passes 8-0-0

Steve Bartelli supports having a hunt in the Municipality but all residents should have an opportunity to harvest not just disabled. If firearms at an issue Steve mentioned this hunt could be opened to archery or some other special weapons. Jehnifer pointed out that if this hunt is pursued caution and sensitivity need to be given to ensure non-hunting users who recreate in the park are not brought to a position of anti-hunting. She supports expanded opportunities to hunt especially if the resource is available but would like to see hunters exercise understanding and ethics so that the perception of hunting is not damaged. She is concerned that the proposed gain of a couple permits does not outweigh the potential for user group conflicts within this particular area in addition to its close proximity to a population center. Mike felt like it is a can of worms with a large population nearby. Terry mentioned that we do not want to antagonize people particularly joggers and hikers for possibly just a few moose permits. According to Gino any new hunt in Anchorage is controversial. ADF&G's fall estimate was about 10 -12 animals, but moose may be moving in and out of this area. Steve Bartelli tired of worrying about everyone's feelings all the time however he feels that this might not be a good fight to start on. Bill Folsom mentioned traffic with hikers, skiers, dog walkers could create a large uproar over a hunt in this area. Mel felt if there are surplus moose that can be harvested then a harvest should be allowed. Motion failed 2-9-0.

BOF Statewide Shellfish proposal comments

Proposals 258, 259, and 260. Birch Yuknis is in favor of all of these proposals, as the number of recreational users far exceeds the number of commercial operators and there is simply not enough shrimp for large commercial harvests. Mel was opposed to the opening of commercial shrimping, but now sees more people getting into it, and does not want to see this taken away. According to Sam Ivey with ADF&G the current allocation is 40% commercial fishery and 60% sport. Note if the threshold of 100, 000 harvestable surplus shrimp is not available only the sport shrimping is available. Birch says the problem he sees is that when the commercial operators comes through with large numbers of pots the number of available shrimp decreases dramatically. Steve reported that other people's pots are sometimes raided. Law enforcement agreed that there is considerable robbing of pots some by sport users as well. Mel mentioned that the commercial area is shifted on a 3 year rotation. Bill wondered what type of monitoring of the commercial user there is. Sam said the sport people have a permit and report at the end of the season most commercial fisheries report on a more regular basis but he did not know specifics about this fishery. Law enforcement said that they did not know of a lot of enforcement effort on shellfish but specifically mentioned they focus heavily on salmon. Bill's point was that both commercial and sport fisheries may be managed more on an honor system than through concerted effort. Dan made an amendment to close commercial fishing in Area 1. 2nd by Steve. Mel mentioned that closing just one area to commercial harvest would put more commercial effort in the other areas. Steve mentioned that he would like to restrict commercial fishing to just Area 1 and then he the sport could fish the other areas. Most years both gear groups have been harvesting near their GHs, according to Sam. Andy Couch mentioned that he would likely be doing nothing from the information he had on hand. Amendment failed 0-10-1. Proposals 258, 259, 260 as written- Motion failed 0-4-7.

Proposal 251 and 253 is opposed by Birch Yuknis. No action by the Advisory Committee for lack of a knowledge of how to address the issue.

Proposal 244 would create a 60 clam bag limit on the West side of Cook Inlet. Harvest has been prohibited this year on the Eastside of Cook Inlet. According to Sam Ivey with ADF&G About 98% of the clam harvest on the westside has been commercial at this point. There may likely be some kind of increase in sport effort on the westside of Cook Inlet. No current biological issue. Terry opposes as he feels if there are so many clams currently on the westside we should continue to allow sport harvests to continue. Law enforcement mention was that when the bag limit is decreased clams are high-graded and more smaller ones left. Motion opposed 0-11-0.

Motion to have Terry Nininger represent the AC at the statewide BOF meeting. Motion passed without objection.

Mike Buirge talked about license and tag fee increases being proposed information to be sent out by Jehnifer.

Next Advisory meeting scheduled for April 1, 7 p.m at MTA in Palmer. To work on already written statewide proposals for BOG and Statewide BOF on April 10.

AOC annual meeting is coming up March 6 in Juneau this year according to Mel with a chance to meet with valley legislators.

Dave asked if there are other positions available on the Advisory Committee there are currently 2 spots available. Dave wanted to know if we would want to fill those two spots. Jehnifer said the AC could vote on new members with 2 weeks of public notice.

Dan mentioned that proposals 106 and 107 dealt with any ram hunts and that the Board of Game left the hunts as is.

Sherry Wright, Boards Section, gave a briefing of the recent BOG work session where they decided to change from a 2 year to 3 year cycle (which the Homer AC opposed). As a result, there will not be a BOG meeting on Southcentral Region issues until four years from now. Sherry also handed out a draft proposal (RC 19) that the BOG is working in regarding Dall sheep hunting regs. There are a number of proposals in the current proposal book which address this issue. It was noted that the BOG draft addresses several issues in one proposal, which is not considered acceptable for proposals submitted by the public.
- VIII. New Business:
Jan Rumble, Comm Fish Area Management Biologist, described the Pollock experiment that her office is working on. This experiment is to determine if state waters can provide a smaller harvest of Pollock than would be of interest to local fisherman rather than the large trawlers, thereby creating a fishery that has a less expensive entry level for new and aspiring fisherman. She said the experiment was allocated a catch of 22, 000 pounds in waters off of Kachemak Bay and that in eight trips so far they caught 15,000 pounds. ADF&G biologists have also been monitoring chinook bycatch, a major issue with trawl fleets. They caught 34 chinook of which 32 were successfully released with two as mortality. Apparently, more development is needed.

Elections. We had 8 persons interested in the 7 seats available this year (5 due to term expiration and 2 resignations due to moving as well as 2 alternate seats). Those elected to full terms are Jim Meesis, Doug Malone, Joey Allred Jr., Thomas Hagberg, and Michael Craig. Those

elected to 1 year vacant seats are Philip Jones and Nancy Hillstrand. Hanna Heimbuch was elected to an alternate seat.

The current officers, Chair Dave Lyon, Vice-chair Tom Young, and Secretary George Matz were reelected to their positions.

End of September to mid-October is the first rut. When they are gathering cows they are more apt to come, once they have gathered the cows they are less likely to leave them.</p> <p>AMENDMENT: August 25 – September 25 vote on amendment 5-5 failed This allows a slightly later beginning . Opposed believes the dates should remain the same for reasons stated earlier. Lack of seeing moose, twice the number of people hunting and still not an increased harvest, still have habitat issues. Even the tracks are lacking and question the methodology of the numbers presented. It's better than 5 years ago, but not nearly what they were 15 years ago. There is browse that hasn't even been touched. We are still not making the minimum goal of the harvest objective under intensive management. Prefers a precautionary approach. A change in the date is supported, but for a different reason. One member does see a lot more moose and a lot more bulls, although it's lower than it used to be. The Upper Tanana Fortymile AC has compiled the following comments/recommendations for the Board of Game to consider during the C/SW Meeting in Wasilla on 02-13-15. The AC believes that instead of

commenting on each individual deferred sheep proposal that it would better serve the Board to provide comments pertaining to the overreaching concepts in the sheep proposals and issues identified in Dr. Todd Brinkman's recent sheep survey, so the Board could better understand our ACs point of views/desires.

If the Board chooses to make changes to sheep hunting regulations we recommend the following:

1. Institute a fee for a resident sheep harvest ticket (tag fee) of \$50 - \$200.
2. If you apply for any current sheep draw hunt then you may not hunt from August 10th – 19th in any general harvest area.
3. Motorized vehicle restrictions
 - a. No sheep hunting allowed the same day you've operated a motorized vehicle. Use wording similar to the Same-Day-Airborne law.
 - b. Allow use of motorized vehicles on state maintained roads.
 - c. Rational/Notes: People using motorized vehicles have a tremendous advantage over someone who flew into an area. Once a plane lands, hunters are all on foot and have to wait until the next day to hunt. With the advancements in ATVs, ORVs, boats and other motorized equipment, hunters are using them to travel long distances, spot and harvest sheep in the same day. This was the reason the same-day-airborne law was created, was to restrict hunters from doing just this with airplanes. We agree with the same-day-airborne law and feel it should apply to other motorized equipment equally to create an even playing field. The AC thought that there could be some sort of condition worked out so the at sheep could be retrieved with a motorized vehicle. In this discussion, "motorized vehicle" included land and water based machines. One member was concerned with grouping boats into this and would prefer it to just be restricted to ATVs and ORVs.
4. Starting resident season prior to non-resident season.
 - a. The AC does not support starting resident season prior to the start of non-resident season.
 - b. Rational/Notes: Resident guides, who are very familiar with their use areas, would be able to hunt while waiting for the ability to take clients in the field. This has the potential of not relieving any perceived hunting pressure, but also increasing the actual overall harvest of sheep.
5. Changes to Second-Degree-of-Kindred (SDK) regulations.
 - a. Allow SDK to hunt with their resident relative, but have SDK harvest count against the resident relatives bag limit. IF a SDK harvests a sheep, the accompanying Resident relative may not harvest a sheep in the same regulatory year and may not



accompany another SDK in the same regulatory year. Non-residents would still need to purchase the required locking tag in order to take a sheep.

- b. Rational/Notes: Many members on the AC have concern over the current SDK regulations. They believe that just because a person is a resident that does not mean that they spend anytime participating in hunting activities. Members came to the agreement that a change to how this is done is necessary. The AC believes that anyone circumventing this regulation would already be doing so by not having their relative purchase a sheep locking tag anyway.

- Formerly ACR 8- Kuskokwim River: Consider providing the commissioner of ADF&G emergency order authority to restrict gillnet gear in the Kuskokwim River drainage (new proposal 272)

There is a March 3rd deadline for AC recommendations or comments to the Board of Fisheries. Proposal 272, formerly ACR 8, wants to have Tier 2 but it was made into a proposal in Juneau. The document is in the packet. Kuskokwim Salmon Management wants to restrict gill net gear to conserve the Chinook: use lawful gear and specifications to use gillnet. Holly read part of the article on proposal 272. Comment from (Akiak member) Jackson Williams, in previous meetings with AC the elders have stated that using the 6" gear will eventually produce smaller and smaller salmon. Lot of elders oppose restrictions because gradually fish will decline with this size of mesh, elders say that fish, after caught, going back to the water (i.e. falling out of the net), is doing more harm than good (because those fish may die before they reach spawning grounds). Also, a former Yukon resident said that dip netting in the Kuskokwim will not work because he has tried it here. John Andrew stated that dipnetting is to be used only in times of Chinook shortages.

See more discussion and vote below. 9 yes, 1 no (from Phillip Peter Akiachak).

OTHER BUSINESS:

- Discuss moose quota/season and discuss need to write proposal-suggested by 2 members

William Brown (Eek) asked if the 24 hour time frame to call in for a moose kill can be extended another day due to traveling and distance but the answer was to keep from going over the 100 limit of moose that it would have to stay the same to keep from overharvesting the moose. When the snow is favorable for counting, sometime in February, they will have a better idea of what the limit (quota) will be and can be adjusted accordingly.

Jackson Williams asked about a winter hunt in the Kuskokwim area but the answer was that the numbers are not favorable at the present time, maybe in 3 to 5 years it may be feasible.

Earl Samuelson commented changing the boundaries for easier access and the answer was it would take several meetings to do it.
