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Volunteer Timesheet Update

Thank you for filling out and submitting the Volunteer Timesheets with the rest of your class paperwork. To give you an idea of how many hours have been volunteered so far in FY19 (July 2018-June 2019), and the amount this is worth as in-kind match for access to P-R funds:

 $5{,}114$ volunteer hours x \$41.50/hr = \$212,231 in-kind match x 3 = **\$636,693 Federal Aid P-R funds**


A couple of common errors we've noticed:

- Instructors need to sign each line in the table where they've entered a date and hours in the table (ie-Taught 1 day=1 signature, Taught 2 days=2 signatures).
- Don't forget to total all of your volunteer hours.
- If you are a Lead Instructor for a class, please sign the rest of your co-instructor's timesheets on the bottom line provided. Do not sign your own timesheet at the bottom, the HIT Program Coordinator will sign there.

National Archery in the Schools Program Update



The National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) has moved into another new and exciting year! Currently, there are over 200 schools in Alaska participating in the program. Since the first of the year, 30 new NASP Basic Archery

Instructors (BAI) have been trained to conduct NASP in a total of 13 schools. Five of the 13 schools are brand new to the program! We are excited to see the program grow within our state.

The 2019 Alaska State NASP Bullseye and 3D Virtual Tournaments came to a close on February 20th, with great results. Alaska had 17 schools with a total of 302 students participate in the Bullseye tournament and 10 schools with 184 youth participate in the 3D tournament. We are proud to announce that multiple students qualified through the state tournaments to participate in the 2019 NASP National Tournament which will be held in Salt Lake City in August. We would like to extend a big thanks to all those who helped with the tournament and congratulate the students who participated! Next year we hope to increase participation in the virtual tournament to 1,000 students!

NASP gives every student, regardless of their skill level, or ability, the opportunity to compete in a sporting activity which promotes self-confidence, team work, discipline, and physical



fitness. The NASP program also offers scholarships, an Academic Archer program, and more.

Each year the HIT Program recognizes a few of these amazing volunteers by selecting them to receive Instructor of the Year Awards. These awards are designed to recognize volunteers who have considerably advanced the cause of safe hunting through extraordinary service in training or education. These volunteers have often been involved with the HIT Program for multiple years, donating countless hours of teaching time and reaching thousands of students with lessons on responsibility, conservation, firearms safety, and safety in the outdoors.
